Enjoy your springtime with your family.



Easter Sunday Sunrise Service




There's a reason why Easter Sunday is often celebrated with church service at the crack of dawn. As <u>the story goes</u>, Mary opened Jesus's tomb early in the morning to find it empty — which is why so many churches now hold services at an early hour to honor the momentous occasion.

In fact, the tradition of sunrise Easter service <u>dates back to 1732</u>, when the first service was held in Germany by the Moravian Church. A group of young men gathered at the first light of dawn at the town's graveyard to sing hymns — and the next year, the entire congregation joined in. <u>By 1773</u>, the first sunrise service for Easter was held in Winston-Salem, North Carolina.




